MINUTES

WYOMING COMMUNITY COLLEGE COMMISSION MEETING June 1, 2016

Casper College Casper, Wyoming

The June 1, 2016 regular Commission meeting was called to order by Commission Chair Saundra Meyer at Casper College, Casper, Wyoming at 8:40 a.m.

Commissioners present: Commissioners Larry Atwell, Charlene Bodine, Bruce Brown, Katherine Dooley, Sherri Lovercheck, Saundra Meyer and Wendy Sweeny.

Commission staff present: Executive Director Jim Rose, Deputy Director and Chief Financial Officer Matt Petry, Programs Team Leader Joe McCann, Fiscal Team Leader Larry Buchholtz and Administrative Services Manager Claire Smith.

A roll call was taken. A quorum was present. Due notice had been published. Commissioner Meyer asked for introductions.

Motion: Commissioner Sweeny moved and Commissioner Lovercheck seconded a motion to approve the agenda. **Motion passed unanimously**.

CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETINGS

Motion: Commissioner Bodine moved and Commissioner Dooley seconded a motion to approve the minutes of the April 22, 2016 commission meeting. **Motion passed unanimously**.

ORGANIZATIONS AND ALLIANCES

- 1. WY Association of Community College Trustees (WACCT): WACCT President Walt Wragge said the names of WACCT award winners Troy Miller (NWCCD) and John Patrick (EWC) have been forwarded to ACCT for the regional competition. Erin Taylor Executive Director said they will be discussing the FY17 budget, programming and the annual Executive Director review at their WACCT meeting. The fall summit will be in Laramie on October 20th and 21st. The date for the WACCT awards and legislative session has been moved to February 8, 2017 in Cheyenne. Commissioner Meyer complimented Erin on her work during the 2016 legislative session.
- 2. Wyoming Department of Education (WDE): Chief Academic Officer Brent Bacon said they will meet with the Joint Education Interim Committee in June in collaboration with Dr. Rose, Department of Workforce Services (DWS) and the University of Wyoming (UW). Science standards are out for comment for another 45 days. They are doing surveys of schools around the state to find out their needs concerning technology and digital learning. They are working on a program similar to WYCLASS to replace their on-line registration system. The new Chief Policy Officer will be Lisa Weigel, who is currently the Director of Individualized Learning. There will be a professional development opportunity at the STEM conference in Rock Springs Aug 1-3. Mr. Bacon asked for information on any other K-12 or

student trainings at the colleges they can post on the WDE website. Commissioner Sweeny asked where they are with the statewide assessment to which Mr. Bacon stated they have started the request for proposal (RFP) process to build a new assessment. The assessment is expected to be in place in two years. She asked if they are collaborating with WCCC on what should be included and Dr. Rose said he is part of the group developing the components for the RFP.

- 3. <u>President's Council</u>: Dr. Schaffer thanked the commissioners for attending commencements. The presidents have been busy setting FY17 budgets and dealing with further reductions in state revenue. The Executive Council has not made much progress on the resolution for a K12 partnership but Dr. Leach has started a draft. Commissioner Atwell asked the presidents to come to agreement on the resolution today.
- 4. Wyoming Faculty Alliance: No one was present for this report.
- 5. <u>Wyoming PBS</u>: The report was included in the meeting packet and Bob Connolly Assistant General Manager had no additional information.
- 6. <u>Complete College Wyoming (CCW)</u>: Dr. Freeze said they have accomplished quite a bit since the last update. The team has developed goals for FY17 and will revamp the website soon. They will be hosting a session around Oct 7 to bring high school, college and UW math and English instructors together to talk about seamless transitions. UW is interested in working with CCW regarding transitions in these areas. A representative from Complete College America may be in attendance. They will also look at motivational factors that make students more inclined to be successful.

UPDATES AND REPORTS

Financial Report: Matt Petry discussed the financial statements and highlighted the following:

- Administration payroll is short because we never received funding to cover pay raises and agencies are expected to cover them from other areas, if possible. The maintenance agreement surplus is due to positive contract negotiations. The IT funding from last biennium will be used in full by the end of June.
- Statewide Longitudinal Data System some expenditures expected for this unit will be paid with the IT funding from the last biennium.
- Course completion will be replaced with credit completion.
- Enrollment growth was distributed using course completion volumes in BFY15. In BFY17 it will be distributed as it was prior to BY15 (75% on true enrollment growth and 25% using credit completion) and this is the last time we will receive enrollment growth due to the recalibration of base funding.
- Health insurance shows a surplus but it must revert to the general fund. The funds were appropriated specifically for health insurance and cannot be used for anything else.
- Retirement will have a shortfall which will be allocated proportionately in 4th quarter reimbursements. The colleges will need to cover the shortfalls from their own budgets.
- Contingency reserve is funded with coal lease bonus funds. FY17 is expected to be the last year we receive this amount and it is likely to be a smaller amount than in the past.
- WY Family Literacy will revert at least \$135,000. This was defunded in the 2016 legislative session and as centers shut down, their requests are smaller. The Jackson center is likely to be the only one to remain open as they have obtained private funding. The surplus cannot be transferred to Adult Education or used to cover expenses beyond June 30.
- Adult education funds will be completely spent by June 30. Federal funds will be carried over into BFY17 and have a 27 month spending window.

- High School equivalency certificate program will have a reversion primarily due to the position frozen back in October. This will pay for a part time staff member in BFY17.
- WY Investment in Nursing surplus will be carried over into BFY17 and can be used for any shortfalls in nursing faculty if needed.
- Nursing Faculty will be completely spent but the student funds are available if there is a shortfall.
- Teacher Shortage Loan Repayment Program sunsets June 30, 2016. We have already reverted some funds and have kept enough to complete the program.
- WY Adjunct Professor Loan Repayment program will have a reversion. These funds were awarded to a faculty member who later backed out of the program. This program has a sizeable cut for BFY17 and will drop to \$95,000.
- Veterans Tuition Waiver Program will have a reversion as demand has flattened.
- WY Public Television (WPTV) endowment interest shows \$132,000 income generated off the endowment fund. The WPTV Council funds will revert.

Motion: Commissioner Sweeny moved and Commissioner Atwell seconded a motion to accept the financial report. **Motion passed unanimously**.

CONSIDERATION OF COMMISSION RULES

Claire Smith summarized the changes to regular and emergency rules, which are also included in the meeting packet. **Motion**: Commissioner Atwell moved and Commissioner Bodine seconded a motion to adopt emergency rules for chapters 1 and 5. **Motion passed unanimously. Motion:** Commissioner Bodine moved and Commissioner Sweeny seconded a motion to approve draft regular rules for chapters 1, 2, 4, 5, and 7. **Motion passed unanimously.**

Dr. Rose informed the commissioners that the residency rules at UW have changed since we brought our rules into alignment with theirs. The new requirements do not allow students to obtain residency status if they receive any support from out of state and are in Wyoming primarily as students. Most community college students go to school part-time while working and are not comparable to typical UW students. UW is currently reviewing this regulation for additional changes because of student objections to the policy. We may need to consider a change to our residency rules next year once we know how UW is going to clarify this issue. We will continue to reference the UW Regulation 8-1 in place when our chapter 3 rules were updated last year.

CONSIDERATION OF CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION PRIORITIZATION AND AUTHORIZATIONS Dr. Rose discussed the meeting with Mel Muldrow, Administrator for Construction Management Division (CMD) from the previous day. The commissioners' responsibility is to approve a capital construction list to forward to CMD. Larry Buchholtz discussed the two projects submitted for prioritization. LCCC's Fine Arts Building was priority number 1 on last year's list but has moved down to number 2 this year behind NWCCD's Health Science Building. The changes to capital measures 4, 5 and 9 approved at the last meeting were applied to the rankings but did not affect the priority order. Dr. Schaffer and Larry Buchholtz discussed the changes to the LCCC Physical Education Renovation requiring authorization from the Commission.

Motion: Commissioner Brown moved and Commissioner Lovercheck seconded a motion to approve the capital construction priority as ranked by the capcon model. **Motion passed unanimously**. **Motion**: Commissioner Atwell moved and Commissioner Brown seconded a motion to authorize the Physical Education building at LCCC. **Motions passed unanimously**.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

- Joint Education Interim Committee (JEIC) Dr. Rose said they have been asked to make a presentation to the JEIC along with the Superintendent of Public Instruction, a representative from the Governor's office, UW and the Department of Workforce Services Research and Planning on June 13th about updates to the Hathaway program, specifically on data dealing with measures of success derived from the success curriculum. WCCC IT staff have produced a performance report summarizing relevant information on scholarship levels and student success, challenges students at each level exhibit regarding retention, persistence and grade point average. The data should be useful to the JEIC as they continue to refine the Hathaway program. The report does not include UW's data.
- Joint Appropriations Interim Committee (JAIC) There will be a meeting July 19th 20th in Cheyenne to discuss the Management Council directive on the "funding allocation model" and the role of the legislature in approval of programs and building construction. There will be another meeting on June 21st to discuss budget reductions. Five agencies representing 75% of the general fund budget will attend: Department of Health, Department of Corrections, Department of Family Services, UW and WCCC. The governor has developed a plan on how to proceed with the increased budget challenges and will discuss it with those agencies. The governor is trying to be transparent on how the reductions will affect those agencies. The cuts will be codified in the 2017 legislative session through the supplemental budget.
- Budget It is uncertain how this will turn out when the legislature looks at it during the session. Last week's budget meeting with the governor and the colleges was productive. The governor asked Dr. Rose about the long term consequences of reductions and whether or not the colleges can recover. Dr. Rose explained there is no going back once a program is closed. Dr. Rose informed the governor and his staff of the unique nature of college budgets and how 4 mill and property taxes have also plummeted. Discussion took place on the need for a need-based aid program.

OTHER BUSINESS

Motion: Commissioner Sweeny moved and Commissioner Bodine seconded a motion to schedule the February meeting on February 9th, 2017. **Motion passed unanimously**.

Motion: Commissioner Atwell moved and Commissioner Lovercheck seconded a motion to adopt the resolution as amended on collaboration with the WDE and UW. The amended resolution reads as follows:

RESOLUTION

WYOMING COMMUNITY COLLEGE COMMISSION RESOLVES
TO COLLABORATE WITH THE WYOMING DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION
AND THE UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING TO ALIGN STUDENT LEARNING LEADING TO STUDENT
SUCCESS

WHEREAS the Wyoming Community College Commission established its highest strategic priority as an educated citizenry for the State of Wyoming,

AND WHEREAS all sectors of public education seek to serve the citizenry with this lofty mission from K-12 through the Community Colleges and on to the University of Wyoming,

AND WHEREAS direct evidence exists that the more education an individual accomplishes the higher the ultimate earning power of that individual,

AND WHEREAS the greatest success is experienced by individuals who successfully move from one level of education to the next without delay,

AND WHEREAS inadequate preparation is the greatest threat to a successful journey along the education pathway,

AND WHEREAS a high school diploma is the strongest predictor of success at the community college and The University,

AND WHEREAS the high school diploma is an indicator of future academic success,

AND WHEREAS the educational outcomes at the high school are building blocks for future learning in higher education and the use of consistent measures to document that attainment is paramount,

AND WHEREAS the Governor, the Legislature, and multiple external entities judge the value of each level of education in the State of Wyoming by the ultimate success of our students,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Wyoming Community College Commission is dedicated to participate in the work to align learning outcomes from K-12 through the Community Colleges to promote successful transition in Mathematics, English, and Reading as students move onto The University of Wyoming and the world of work,

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that this work requires collaboration from all sectors of education to create an educated citizenry in the State of Wyoming.

Dr. Leach said this resolution requests the WDE to include the colleges in the process of alignment of education throughout the state and coordination of assessments. Commissioner Lovercheck asked how we use the resolution in our work with the WDE. Dr. Leach said this is a statement of principle saying we are a complete educational system of the state. **Motion passed unanimously**.

Commissioner Sweeny asked if revisions need to be made to the strategic plan 2.0. Dr. Rose discussed the need for continued refinement on strategic measures included in 2.0, performance funding and servicing need-based students. He shared information on how other states are handling this. A continuing rearticulation of goals is important. Our continued updates to performance measures keeps us in compliance with the statutory requirement to update the strategic plan.

At the time of packet preparation, there were only two full months of expenditures for this 24-month biennium. As such, many budget line-items had not yet had expenditures posted to them, and therefore biennial projections were difficult. The only items of note are as follows:

- Data Management and Analytical Reporting (Page 2) This is a "new" financial report, and it
 will track usage of the \$3.45 million first received last Spring, and then carried over to this
 biennium. Approximately \$85,000 of the appropriation was spent last biennium.
- Contingency Reserve (Page 9) Coal Lease Bonus Fund revenue received in October is expected to be less than what's been received in the past \$1.6 million. And no revenue is expected for fiscal-year 2018.
- Family Literacy Program With the Legislature's defunding of this program, there is no longer a corresponding financial report.
- High School Equivalency Certificate (Page 13) This appropriation now funds a part-time position, rather than a full-time position as it had in the past.
- WylN Nursing Grant & Loan Program (Page 14) Budget Cuts to this side of the WylN Program (i.e., the student side) had to be deeper in order to maintain statutorily-mandated full funding on the faculty side (see Page 15 of the Financial Reports). However, carry-over funding from last biennium may be sufficient to support the student side for the current biennium. Unfortunately, without an exception request for 2019-2020, future funding of the student side will be a fraction of its historical funding.
- Teacher Shortage Loan Repayment Program (Page 16) Though this program sunsetted on June 30, reporting will continue to track relatively small, allowable expenditures, primarily for loan servicing fees.
- Veterans Tuition Waiver Program (Page 18) In satisfaction of the budget cuts, it was
 proposed that this program be eliminated, but the Governor's Office provided \$600,000 for
 continuation of the program through the Spring 2017 semester. Technically, it's two
 \$300,000 appropriations one for the Fall 2016 semester, and another for the Spring 2017
 semester.

The content and format of this report have been developed through a collaborative effort between the Wyoming Community College Commission and the Data Governance Institutional Research Council members representing the seven community colleges. Most of the tables relay data that have been tracked by both of the aforementioned entities for over 15 years.

The enrollment reports continue to evolve as new data sets are needed to meet federal mandates, as well as to meet current requirements of the state and community colleges.

Pertinent information to keep in mind while reading this report includes the following:

- Data in this report represent student enrollment the day after 12% of each course had been completed.
- Student headcount in this report includes students who are enrolled for a letter grade, pass/fail designation as well as those who are auditing a course.
- Full-time designation is achieved by being enrolled in a minimum of twelve (12) credit hours in one semester.
- -"Full-time equivalency means the number of approved academic or vocational-technical credit hours for each class for which students are enrolled divided by twelve (12)". W.S. 21-18-102 (a)(xii).
- "Duplicated headcount" means that within a survey or polling exercise of numerous programs and/or courses, a student may be counted more than once. WCCC Rules -2015
- "Unduplicated headcount" means that within a survey or polling exercise of numerous programs and/or courses, a student shall be counted only once. WCCC Rules -2015

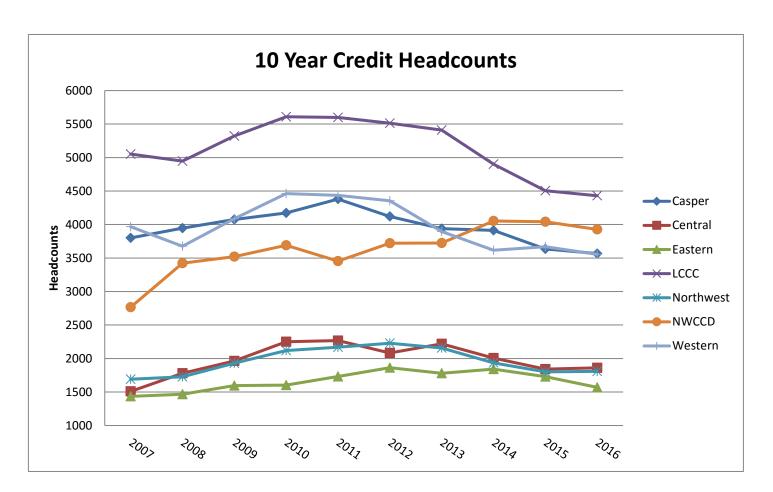

Wyoming Community College System 2015-2016 Annual Enrollment Report Introduction

This report provides an annual look at the summer 2015, fall 2015 and spring 2016 terms' enrollment in categories such as enrollment status, location and demographics of the community college student population. The content and format of this report have been developed through a collaborative effort between the Wyoming Community College Commission (WCCC) and the Data Governance/ Institutional Research Council members representing the seven community colleges. Most of the tables relay data that have been tracked by both of the aforementioned entities for over 15 years.

Pertinent information to keep in mind while reading this report include the following:

- The annualized totals are calculated by the nationally recognized method of adding the summer, spring and fall semesters together and then dividing the total in half.
- Student headcount in this report includes students who are enrolled for a letter grade, pass/fail designation, as well as those who are auditing a course.
- Full-time designation is achieved by being enrolled in a minimum of twelve (12) credit hours in one semester.
- "Full-time equivalency means the number of approved academic or vocational-technical credit hours for each class for which students are enrolled divided by twelve (12)". W.S. 21-18-102 (a)(xii).
- "Duplicated headcount" means that within a survey or polling exercise of numerous programs and/or courses, a student may be counted more than once. WCCC Rules -2015
- "Unduplicated headcount" means that within a survey or polling exercise of numerous programs and/or courses, a student shall be counted only once. WCCC Rules -2015

Table 1a- *Credit Headcounts*: Credit headcount accounts for each student only once, regardless of the amount of credit hours taken in a semester with full-time designation at 12 or more credit hours and part-time being anything under 12 credit hours in a given semester. When compared to last year, the overall credit headcount decreased by 830 students or 3.3%. The full-time headcount decreased by 81 and part-time headcount decreased by 749.

Table 1b- *Full-time Equivalents*: These data look at the total credit hours taken by full-time and part-time students and divide the respective totals by 12 to establish an FTE. The grand total of both full-time and part-time FTE decreased by 191 or approximately 1.2% when compared with the 2014-2015 academic year FTE total.

Table 2- *Credit Headcount by Age:* Age categories have been re-defined to provide age data consistent with IPEDS reporting. Subsequently a comparison with last year's data is not available.

Table 3- The *Headcount by Gender:* The data show a slight increase in the percentage of the female cohort, going from 53.9% during the 14-15 academic year to 54.84% in the 15-16 academic year.

Table 4- *Credit Headcount by County:* Total In-state enrollment decreased by a credit headcount of 564.5, non-resident headcount decreased by 136.0 and the international cohort decreased by 129.5.

Table 5- *Credit FTE by County*: The three largest county FTE increases occurred in; Big Horn County by 56.8, Sweetwater County by 42.6 and Campbell County by 37.5. The three largest decreases occurred in; Albany County by 46.8, Converse County by 37.6 and Natrona County by 23.8 when compared to last year's annual FTE.

Table 6- *Headcount by Credit Hours:* The ranking of enrollment by credit hour categories remains the same as the last three years; highest enrollment is in the three credit hour category at 16.85%, followed by four credit hours, 9.14% and 1 credit hour with 7.39% of the total enrollment.

Table 8- Level of Instruction and Student/Faculty Ratio: Student to Faculty Ratio, (calculated for the fall semester only) remained the same as last year's ratio of 18 to 1 for the fall 2015 term. FTE enrollment delineated by level of instruction as a percentage of the total FTE enrollment is as follows:

Wyoming Community College System Term Enrollment Report

This report provides a look at the (spring, summer, fall) 201x (semester or annual) enrollment in categories such as student enrollment, location and demographics of the community college student population. The content and format of this report has been developed through a collaborative effort between the Wyoming Community College Commission, President's Council and the Data Governance Institutional Research Council members representing the seven community colleges. Data in this report came directly from the colleges after their review and analysis for accuracy. These data may vary from enrollment reports posted on Wyoming college websites due to extraction date and sub-set parameter differences. College enrollment data constantly change and are therefore not stagnant.

Pertinent definitions to keep in mind while reading this report include the following:

- Full-time designation is achieved by being enrolled in a minimum of twelve (12) credit hours in one semester.
- "Full-time equivalency means the number of approved academic or vocational-technical credit hours for each class for which students are enrolled divided by twelve (12)". W.S. 21-18-102 (a)(xii).
- "Duplicated headcount" means that within a survey or polling exercise of numerous programs and/or courses, a student may be counted more than once. WCCC Rules -2015
- "Unduplicated headcount" means that within a survey or polling exercise of numerous programs and/or courses, a student shall be counted only once. WCCC Rules -2015
- -"Concurrent enrollment course" means a college course section taught by high school faculty who have been approved as community college adjunct faculty and who are teaching said course as part of their duties as a school district employee. As such, these college courses simultaneously satisfy high school graduation requirements. These courses have been approved by the community college as having equivalent course content, learning objectives and work assignments as an existing college course. Course content and learning objectives are equivalent to the related community college course as determined and defined by community college faculty. WCCC Rules -2015
- -"Dual enrollment credit" means credit given to qualified high school students who complete college level courses for which the community college hires and pays the instructor and in which the school district agrees to allow high school graduation credit. WCCC Rules -2015
- -"Distance learning" means the student and faculty member are separated by time or space. WCCC Rules -2015

WYOMING COMMUNITY COLLEGE ACCREDITATION ACTIVITY APRIL 1, 2015 – MARCH 31, 2016

This summary is provided in compliance with W.S. 21-18-202(e)(i), which requires the Wyoming Community College Commission (WCCC) to "report the findings of institutional and specialized accreditation studies." Because continued North Central Association – Higher Learning Commission (HLC) institutional accreditation is reaffirmed for various periods of time and institutions applied for candidacy at various times in the past, each of the Wyoming community colleges is at a different phase of the on-going regional accreditation process. An HLC regional accreditation schedule is provided on page seven.

A schedule for specialized program accreditation status begins on page nine. Each Wyoming community college has at least one program with program accreditation agency affiliation.

ACCREDITATION BY THE HIGHER LEARNING COMMISSION (HLC)

The Higher Learning Commission is an independent corporation. The HLC is one of six regional institutional accreditors in the United States. The HLC accredits degree-granting post-secondary educational institutions in the North Central region. Institutional accreditation is a voluntary process that serves the critical purposes of quality assurance and institutional and program improvement. Colleges that are accredited by the HLC continually evaluate their overall institutions and programs in light of the criteria for accreditation set forth by the HLC.

THE CRITERIA FOR (HLC) ACCREDITATION

(January 1, 2013)

The Criteria for Accreditation are the standards of quality by which the WCCC determines whether an institution merits accreditation or reaffirmation of accreditation. They are as follows:

Criterion One: Mission

The institution's mission is clear and articulated publicly; it guides the institution's operations.

Criterion Two: Integrity (Ethical and Responsible Conduct)

The institution acts with integrity; its conduct is ethical and responsible.

Criterion Three: Teaching and Learning (Quality, Resources, and Support)

The institution provides high quality education, wherever and however its offerings are delivered.

Criterion Four: Teaching and Learning (Evaluation and Improvement)

The institution demonstrates responsibility for the quality of its educational programs, learning environments, and support services, and it evaluates their effectiveness for student learning through processes designed to promote continuous improvement.

Criterion Five: Resources, Planning, and Institutional Effectiveness

The institution's resources, structures, and processes are sufficient to fulfill its mission, improve the quality of its educational offerings, and respond to future challenges and opportunities. The institution plans for the future.

PATHWAYS TO HLC REAFFIRMATION OF ACCREDITATION

The WCCC maintains processes for determining eligibility for accreditation, for achieving candidacy status, for achieving initial accreditation, and for maintaining accreditation. The WCCC is now replacing PEAQ with two new Pathways, the Standard Pathway and the Open Pathway. The AQIP Pathway will continue largely unchanged.

Standard Pathway

The Standard Pathway seeks to achieve the following goals:

- To reduce the reporting burden on institutions by utilizing as much information and data as possible from existing institutional processes and collecting them in electronic form as they naturally occur over time
- To enhance rigor by checking institutional data annually (Institutional Update) and conducting comprehensive evaluations twice in the ten-year cycle
- To integrate as much as possible all HLC processes and requests for data into the reaffirmation of accreditation cycle

The Standard Pathway is available to all accredited institutions at any time, unless the institution is on Probation or under a Show-Cause order, when it follows a separate process. Some institutions are limited to the Standard Pathway. Two comprehensive evaluations take place in a ten year cycle: one in Year 4 and one in Year 10. Both quality assurance and quality improvement are integrated into these comprehensive evaluations as well as Federal Compliance. In addition, the institution addresses quality assurance and improvement through interim monitoring, as required. In the Standard Pathway, both assurance and improvement are directly related to the Criteria for Accreditation.

The components of the comprehensive evaluation in the Standard Pathway are:

- 1. An Assurance Review:
- 2. An Improvement Review;
- 3. A review of Federal Compliance;
- 4. An on-site visit; and
- 5. If applicable, a multi-campus review

Open Pathway

The Open Pathway seeks to achieve the following goals:

- To enhance institutional value by opening the improvement aspect of accreditation so that institutions may choose Quality Initiatives to suit their current circumstances
- To reduce the reporting burden on institutions by utilizing as much information and data as possible from existing institutional processes and collecting them in electronic form as they naturally occur over time
- To enhance rigor by checking institutional data annually (Institutional Update) and conducting Assurance Reviews twice in the ten-year cycle
- To integrate as much as possible all HLC processes and HLC requests for data into the reaffirmation of accreditation cycle.

Two Assurance Reviews take place in the ten-year cycle; one in Year 4 and one in Year 10. The Year 4 review occurs asynchronously via the HLC's online Assurance System and without a visit. The Year 10 review also is conducted with the Assurance System but includes a visit to the campus, as noted below. Between Years 5 and 9 of the ten-year cycle, the institution proposes and completes a Quality Initiative which focuses on institutional innovation and improvement.

The components of the comprehensive evaluation in the Open Pathway are:

- 1. An Assurance Review;
- 2. A review of Federal Compliance;
- 3. An on-site visit; and
- 4. If applicable, a multi-campus review.

Academic Quality Improvement Program (AQIP) Pathway

The Academic Quality Improvement Program (AQIP) is one of several pathways leading to accreditation with the HLC. Others include the Open and Standard Pathways. AQIP differs from the other pathways in that it is premised on principles of continuous quality improvement, and its various processes and requirements are designed to assist institutions in achieving quality improvement, along with reaffirming the institution's accredited status with the HLC once every AQIP cycle. Many institutions have reported transforming their quality cultures since embarking on the AQIP Pathway. Federal compliance is reviewed.

WYOMING COMMUNITY COLLEGE HLC ACCREDITATION SUMMARIES

CASPER COLLEGE (OPEN PATHWAY)

Casper College is preparing for the 2018-2019 academic year reaffirmation of accreditation from the HLC by continuation of a quality initiative and development of an assurance argument. The quality initiative is being completed in the HLC facilitated Persistence & Completion Academy (cohort 3; data development track). The Casper College P&C team will reach the halfway point and will participate in the May 2016 midpoint roundtable academy event. Multiple campus teams are drafting the narrative and gathering evidence to complete the assurance argument in the online HLC reporting portal. The last HLC peer review visit (PEAQ) was in 2009. All progress reports requested from that visit have been successfully submitted.

CENTRAL WYOMING COLLEGE (AQIP PATHWAY)

Central Wyoming College (CWC) underwent a comprehensive re-affirmation visit under the Open Pathway in October, 2015. The college's accreditation status was subsequently re-affirmed by the HLC. As part of the reaffirmation, CWC was required to submit two interim monitoring reports. The first, due in April, 2016, asked the college to make adjustments to its credit hour policy and articulation agreements. That report was accepted by HLC and no further monitoring on those topics is required. The second monitoring report, due in October, 2017, concerns the assessment of student learning. The college is required to submit a variety of evidence of sustainable learning assessment systems.

Upon re-affirmation, CWC became eligible to choose its Accreditation Pathway, and elected to join the AQIP Pathway. CWC will participate in its first AQIP activities in the 2016-2017 academic year.

In August, 2015 CWC opened a new building in its Lander outreach location. Approval of the new location required a visit from HLC, which occurred in April, 2016. Official HLC approval of the new location is expected later in 2016.

Central Wyoming College continues to participate in HLC's 4-year Persistence and Completion Academy, which will conclude in 2018.

EASTERN WYOMING COLLEGE (OPEN PATHWAY)

Eastern Wyoming College (EWC) in Torrington was recommended for a ten-year reaccreditation following the HLC team visit in 2010. A focus visit was completed October 5-6, 2014 emphasizing improving ethnic diversity among students and staff. The Institutional Actions Council of the Higher Learning Commission concurred with the evaluation findings and affirmed that the institution is addressing the concerns related to diversity. Eastern Wyoming College has been accepted and is participating in the Higher Learning Commission Persistence and Student Completion Academy. The next comprehensive visit will be scheduled for 2020-2021.

LARAMIE COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE (AQIP PATHWAY)

Laramie County Community College (LCCC) has participated in the Academic Quality Improvement Program (AQIP) to maintain its accreditation since 2006. As part of this participation, LCCC worked on several action projects during the reporting period. These are summarized below.

Through the project to <u>Conduct an Environmental Scan of the Albany County Campus (ACC) Service Area</u>, LCCC is examining stakeholders' educational and workforce development needs in Albany County and the City of Laramie. Results will be used to develop academic programming and services to meet those needs and to improve recruitment, retentions, and completions. This project will be completed in fall 2016.

LCCC is implementing the <u>Student Planning</u> module of the Colleague student information system during the 2015-2016 academic year. This module allows for electronic academic planning by students and advisors. As a result of this implementation (to be completed by September 2016), the advising/academic planning process will become more efficient and adaptable to students' ever-changing courses of action.

Through the project <u>Develop an Institutional Projects Coordination Process</u>, LCCC is establishing a formal, centralized process at the College for coordinating institutional projects. Its purpose is to systematically operationalize the Institution's strategic plan and advance the College's mission while making project management more effective and efficient at LCCC. The process will be fully implemented by the end of 2016.

The final project for 2015-16 is to Form a Technology Oversight Committee and Institutional Technology Plan. LCCC has established a new cross-functional committee to provide oversight and guidance for creating and implementing an institutional technology plan, which will be linked to the institution's strategic plan. The effect of this committee will be broad reaching, but most importantly it will create and enhance policies and procedures, which will guide the implementation of the new technology plan. The technology plan will be developed over the course of the next academic year.

NORTHERN WYOMING COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT (AQIP PATHWAY)

Northern Wyoming Community College District (NWCCD), serving Sheridan, Campbell, and Johnson counties, has participated in the Academic Quality Improvement Program (AQIP) form of accreditation with the HLC since 2005. The District recently received feedback on its third Systems Portfolio, submitted fall 2015, and the response was quite favorable. With the official process of reaffirmation of accreditation coming in 2018-2019, the institution will send a team to the Strategy Forum in November 2016 and prepare for the site visit in fall 2017.

The District continues to work on Action Projects. Two of our active projects, Assessing General Education: A Re-Evaluation of Core Abilities and Developing and Implementing Writing Intensive Courses in NWCCD Curriculum, are directly related to student learning. Our third active project, which is nearly complete, is Developing a Process Addressing Alcohol, Drug and Sexual Assault Awareness. The District has retired 19 projects.

NORTHWEST COLLEGE (STANDARD PATHWAY)

Northwest College (NWC) is fully accredited through 2018. The comprehensive PEAQ evaluation on November 15-17, 2010 resulted in recommendations in regard to assessment of student learning, governance, and planning. A focused visit in March 2013 resulted in a recommendation for no further reporting until the next scheduled comprehensive evaluation. The HLC has placed NWC into the Standard Pathway for reaffirmation.

WESTERN WYOMING COMMUNITY COLLEGE (AQIP PATHWAY)

Western Wyoming Community College (WWCC) in Rock Springs was accepted as a participant in the AQIP accreditation pathway in July, 2008. Reaffirmation of Accreditation through the AQIP Pathway is on an eight year cycle, with a comprehensive Systems Portfolio due twice in the cycle. Western submitted its first Systems Portfolio in May 2012; our second Systems Portfolio is due in June, 2017, and the process for completing that project is well underway. A leadership team attended the AQIP Strategy Forum in April, 2016, and designed an action project focused on employee onboarding and supervisor training. In accordance with AQIP requirements, and in a quest for continuous quality improvement, Western maintains a minimum of three active action projects during each academic year, with annual updates submitted to the HLC. Western was accepted into the HLC Persistence and Completion Academy in 2014, and these efforts will comprise one action project for the next few years. Additionally, in this past year, other action projects focused on Academic Rigor and a Redesign of our General Education. In the 2016-2017 academic year, we will continue our focus on the General Education Redesign project and the work of the Persistence and Completion project, as well as the new Employee Onboarding and Supervisor Training project.

10/01/16 Report on Post Secondary Education Options Program

Introduction

The legislature has directed the Wyoming Community College Commission (WCCC) to develop a report to the Joint Interim Education Committee, the community colleges, the Wyoming Department of Education (WDE) and the University of Wyoming (UW) on statewide, post secondary education options program revenues, expenditures, and student participation and completion.

Senate Enrolled Act 52 (2010 Budget Session), hereafter referred to as SEA-52, amended the Postsecondary Education Options Program Act (PEOP) to mandate that high schools, post secondary institutions, UW and community colleges, enter into agreements regarding dual and concurrent enrollment programs.

The Consensus Council, created under SEA-52 in collaboration with stakeholders, requested that the WCCC Academic Affairs Council (AAC) design a template for a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for both concurrent enrollment and for dual enrollment, to be used statewide by all school districts, and community college partners. These two common MOU templates were designed, and first utilized for, the 2010-2011 academic year by the school districts and the seven community colleges. There are concurrent enrollment and/or dual enrollment MOUs between all 48 school districts and at least one of the seven community colleges or UW. Academic year 2013-2014 marked the first year all school districts had such an MOU.

SEA-52 amended the PEOP Act requiring the annual reporting of student enrollment, finances and completion data by school districts, BOCHES, BOCES, community colleges and UW.

Note: Information for this report is obtained by many different sources including UW, the seven community colleges, WDE (who obtain their information from Wyoming school districts) and the Wyoming BOCES/BOCHES. This report, since its inception, has shown inconsistencies in data received, as it does this year. The community colleges report in the same manner, using the same formulas and templates, and their data can be validated. However, data outside of the community college system cannot be validated by the WCCC. While there is confidence in community college data, the same level of confidence is not present with school district data as there are obvious discrepancies and missing

pieces. Therefore, it is necessary to identify data discrepancies either via footnotes, modifications to charts or detailed on the last page of the report and to note the WCCC's position of reporting data provided from multiple agencies, some of which cannot be validated.

Concurrent Enrollment:

The seven community colleges and UW partnered with Wyoming's school districts during the 2015-2016 academic year to provide concurrent enrollment courses to 5,645 students. These students enrolled in 34,098 credit hours and completed 32,195 credit hours. Concurrent enrollment courses are taught by high school faculty who meet each college's qualifications to teach the specific courses offered. Availability of a concurrent course is dependent upon the qualifications of high school faculty members to teach specific courses and the school district's decision to accept specific college course credit toward high school graduation.

Dual Enrollment:

During the 2015-2016 academic year, 19 of Wyoming's 48 school districts recognized dual enrollment course enrollments to meet high school graduation requirements. During that same academic year, the community colleges and UW reported 2,162 students registered for 12,703.25 credit hours and completed 10,950.25 credit hours. UW offered dual enrollment to high school students at one school district. Wyoming's public community colleges offer all freshman and sophomore college courses as options for school districts to select from as dual enrollment opportunities for high school students. Availability of a specific dual enrollment course is dependent upon access to the course through either

face-to-face instruction or distance education. The decision to accept a specific college course to meet high school graduation requirements, is made by the school district.

Distance Dual Credit:

The seven community colleges and UW partnered with school districts during the 2015-2016 academic year to offer distance dual credits. A total of 1,073 students took 5,458 credit hours of distance education and completed 4,499 of them. The seven community colleges offer over 700 online course sections which are all available as dual enrollment courses.

Four BOCES or BOCHES provided \$447,557.00 to community colleges to support concurrent enrollment and three provided \$29,444.09 to school districts supporting concurrent enrollment. Nine BOCES or BOCHES reported they provided \$572,627.45 to community colleges, and two BOCES or BOCHES provided \$56,099.28 to school districts to support dual enrollment.

Seven community colleges reported receiving \$2,538,199.00 from school districts for concurrent enrollment courses and four community colleges reported receiving \$136,887.00 for dual enrollment courses from school districts. Six community colleges reported paying \$2,683,433 to school districts for concurrent enrollment related expenses. Two community colleges received \$413,035 from BOCES or BOCHES for concurrent enrollment courses. Five community colleges reported receiving \$542,767.00 from BOCES or BOCHES for dual enrollment courses. UW was not able to provide fiscal information related to dual enrollment as they do not track expenditures by course.

Six community colleges reported concurrent enrollment expenditures of \$4,206,387.00 and those community colleges reported total concurrent enrollment revenue of \$2,870,699.00. Also, seven community colleges reported dual enrollment expenditures of \$3,655,928.00 as well as total revenue for dual enrollment of \$1,065,443.00.

Sixteen school districts reported concurrent enrollment revenue of \$1,394,317.60. Sixteen school districts also reported paying the community colleges/UW \$1,186,559.00 for concurrent enrollment courses taught at their high schools. Two school districts reported dual enrollment revenue of \$34,704.64. Twelve school districts reported paying \$248,851.00 to the seven community colleges/UW to enroll their high school students in dual enrollment courses. It is worth noting 23 school districts reported enrollment but no revenue or expenditures and one school district reported no enrollment but revenue and expenditures.

Intentionally Left Blank

There are inconsistencies between the headcount and financial data provided to WDE by the school districts and headcount and financial information provided to the WCCC staff by the seven community colleges. WCCC staff did attempt to improve data quality, and some improvements were able to be obtained. For instance, Central Wyoming College staff were able to speak directly to school district staff to determine more accurate enrollment. Some other improvements to this report this year include:

- For this 2015-2016 academic year, all 48 of Wyoming's school districts had MOUs with the seven community colleges for dual and/or concurrent agreements.
- Enrollment numbers for concurrent enrollment, reported by the community colleges and school districts, were much closer this year than in previous years.
- Students appear to be utilizing concurrent enrollment opportunities at a steady or increased rate year after year.
- This year, a process was identified which may improve data validation efforts in coming year and allow for increased time and communication between agencies providing data.

Some challenges do remain however:

- It was not possible to provide all reporting entities sufficient time or common protocols to facilitate each reporting entities' own reconciliation. WDE has noted time constraints collecting full academic year data due to reporting timelines for school districts. WDE is unable to provide full academic year data until late August each year. Once data is received from all entities and aggregated by early September, this does not allow time for entities to analyze discrepancies prior to the October 1 legislative deadline.
- The community colleges and UW reported concurrent enrollment headcount of 5645 while the school districts reported concurrent enrollment headcount of 5271.
- The community colleges and UW reported dual enrollment headcount of 2162 while the school districts reported 743 dual enrollment headcount.
- Twenty-three school districts reported enrollment but no related revenue or expenditures.
- One school district reported revenue and expenditures for dual and concurrent enrollment but no enrollment.
- Three BOCES/BOCHES did not report information to the WCCC for this report.
- It should be noted that students who are home schooled and who participate in dual or concurrent courses would not be counted by the school districts which could account for differences in counts between the entities.

SUMMARY OF RULES CHANGES

The first set of emergency rules Commissioners approved became effective on June 21, 2016 and expire on October 18, 2016. The remaining steps in the regular rules process will start with the adoption of final rules at the October 19, 2016 meeting and could potentially run until January 2, 2017, the end of the time allowed for the governor to give final approval. We will make a state aid distribution to the colleges around December 15, 2016. It is possible that the final regular rules will be effective before those payments are due, but it is not guaranteed. For that reason, Commissioners will **adopt** a second set of **emergency rules** for chapters 1 and 5 as well as **final regular rules** for chapters 1, 2, 4, 5 and 7 at the October 19, 2016 meeting.

We did not receive any comments during the public comment period so there have been no changes to the draft rules, other than minor formatting corrections required by the Registrar of Rules.

A summary of the changes to each chapter is listed below. Copies of the rules have not been included in this packet but can be found at http://www.communitycolleges.wy.edu/rules-and-statutes.aspx.

Chapter 1 (emergency and final regular rules) - Changes in this chapter include the removal or clarification of the following definitions:

Removal: Annualized Full Time Equivalence in section 3

Clarification: Adult Basic Education, CIP code, credit completion, credit certificate, credit courses, and degree in section 3; certificate and credential in section 7

Chapter 2 (final regular rules) – Changes in this chapter include the removal of one reference to family literacy and changes to the rules on contested case hearings. The changes on hearings are included at the suggestion of the Attorney General's office in order for the Commission to adopt the requirements of the Office of Administrative Hearings. This update is being required of all state agencies not authorized to perform their own adjudicating.

Chapter 4 (final regular rules) – Changes in this chapter remove the word "basic" in "adult basic education" references.

Chapter 5 (emergency and final regular rules) - Changes to this chapter include:

Section 3 and 4 – Updates to year references and changes to the funding allocation model in accordance with new performance metrics.

Section 7 – Update the due date for fall applications for the WY Adjunct Professor Loan Repayment program.

Section 9 – Removal of reference to family literacy and updates to scoring processes.

Section 11 – Updates to due dates for capital construction projects.

Chapter 7 (final regular rules) – Changes to this chapter include:

Section 4 – Updates on audit requirements.

Section 6 – Updates for name change of Institutional Research Committee to the Data Governance Institutional Research Council.

Tuition Policy AY18 - AY23

I. Introduction

Funding for higher education in the State of Wyoming is a shared responsibility of the state, students, property owners and the colleges. The state assumes its share of this responsibility through its general fund appropriations; students, through tuition and fees; property owners, through local property tax levies; and the colleges, through management of efficiencies and generation of additional local revenue. The Wyoming Community College Commission plays a role in ensuring the state, students, and the colleges assume the appropriate level of responsibility through its mandate of setting tuition rates.

Tuition rates have a direct bearing on both student access and educational quality. A number of considerations go into establishing tuition rates, and this 6-year tuition policy preserves the Commission's accountability to Wyoming citizens for access while providing affordable, quality postsecondary educational opportunities.

II. Legal Foundation

Wyoming Constitution

Article 1, Section 023. Education

The right of the citizens to opportunities for education shall have practical recognition. The legislature shall suitably encourage means and agencies calculated to advance the sciences and liberal arts.

Article 7, Section 016. Tuition Free

The university shall be equally open to students of both sexes, irrespective of race or color; and, in order that the instruction furnished may be as nearly free as possible, any amount in addition to the income generated from its grants of lands and other sources above mentioned, necessary to its support and maintenance in a condition of

full efficiency shall be raised by taxation or otherwise, under provisions of the legislature.

Note: This Article of the Constitution applies to the University of Wyoming. The legislature may have interpreted this Constitutional provision for tuition to be "as nearly free as possible" when it crafted language in statutes that described the community colleges as "low tuition" institutions.

Wyoming Statute

The legislature stipulated in the 1991 Session Laws of Wyoming, Chapter 228, Section 3(a) that "Wyoming's Community Colleges are low tuition, open access institutions..." Furthermore, the Wyoming Community College Commission was given the authority to determine tuition at the community colleges.

W.S. 21-18-202. Powers and duties of the commission.

- (a) The commission shall perform the following general functions:
 - (ii) Establish tuition rates for the community colleges

WCCC Rules

The Commission's statutory authority to establish tuition rates for the community colleges is reflected in its agency Rules.

Chapter 3, General Functions

Section 4. Establishing Tuition Rates

- (a) The Commission shall establish tuition rates for the community colleges.
- (b) The Commission shall establish a long-range tuition policy (four to six years) and renew or alter it as needed.
- (c) The Commission may review tuition rates at any time and may address tuition rate changes on a short-term or emergency basis. At a minimum, tuition rates will be reviewed by each December.
- (d) The tuition rates may include recognition of differential program delivery costs.
- (e) In the event a commission-approved tuition rate results in an amount other than even dollars, the colleges will round down to the nearest whole dollar amount. This provision applies to in-state, out-of-state, and WUE enrollees.

In keeping with its statutory charge, a review of the current policy occurred on June 1 2016 and has resulted in this new policy.

- In-state tuition rate is \$89 per credit hour for in-state students, \$133 per credit hour for WUE (and Nebraska) students, and \$267 per credit hour for out-of-state and international students.
- Remove the tuition cap effective with the Fall 2017 term, tuition shall be charged for every credit hour taken during a given term.
- Tuition shall be set for 2-year periods that mirror the state's biennial period, however, as stated in Commission Rules, Chapter 3, Section 4 (c), the Commission may change the rate in the interim.

- Tuition reviews, policy enhancements and/or changes, and tuition rate changes shall occur during the Commission's annual March meeting and shall take effect during the next Fall term.
- Tuition reviews will no longer use:
 - o Current average resident tuition and fees to be within two percent of current tuition and fees of WICHE states, less CA plus NE
 - o Ratios of current average tuition and fees to Median Household Income.
 - o Most recent percentage increase in tuition to be within two percent of the nation CPI for the most recent 12 months.

Future Consideration of Tuition Policy

Establish a range (percentile) for which tuition will address the actual cost of delivery of education. This may become the main pillar of tuition policy, agreeing that the cost or rate of credit hour tuition should be within some range (20-25%) of the actual cost of delivering that credit hour of education. Consider formally adopting a methodology using a cost model or other tool.

Review the possibility of establishing differing in-state tuition rates, one that reflects residence in a taxed county and one for residence in a non-taxed county.

Determine if having commission staff provide tuition comparators from neighboring states and UW is warranted to at least gauge how Wyoming community college tuition compares.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees of Laramie County Community College (LCCC), it is my pleasure to submit to you the following request for authorization of LCCC's Albany County Campus classroom expansion and renovation. Over the past year, a hybrid Level I/II plan was completed that would address classroom and laboratory space deficiencies at LCCC's Albany County Campus (ACC). This plan was approved by the Board of Trustees at their September 21, 2016 meeting. This project will allow the ACC to transform an existing dry lab into a wet lab specifically for the delivery of science courses, while also adding two new classroom spaces to the existing facility - a multipurpose wet lab and a larger assembly and flexible classroom.

It is estimated the project will cost \$973,687.57. Funding for this project will come from ACC student fee fund balance currently on hand. The College will not be seeking state funding to assist with this project.

Further information pertaining to this project is included in the attached Level I/II plan. It is anticipated to be completed for the Fall of 2017.

In closing, the Board of trustees and I firmly believe this project clearly meets the *State's Interests* of an **educated citizenry, efficient and effective systems** and **accountability and improvement**. It addresses space deficiencies at the ACC and will open the doors to additional course offerings for high-demand science courses. MEDA 1505 - Introduction to Medical Assisting (5 credits)

This course gives the beginning medical assistant student a foundation in practice within a medical office. Students are introduced to the foundational concepts of professionalism and professional practice, law and ethics in health care, medical office administrative procedures, medical terminology, and medical office finances.

MEDA 1570 - Medical Assisting Office Practicum (4 credits)

This course is designed to give the beginning medical assistant student a foundation in practice within a medical office. Students complete 180 hours of practicum in a medical office setting and experience the administrative concepts of customer service, medical reception, medical business practices, establishing medical records, scheduling appointments, practice finances, and office etiquette.

MEDA 1600 - Medical Assisting Procedures (6 credits)

This course gives the medical assistant student an advancing foundation of practice theory within a medical office. Students are introduced to the clinical concepts of patient intake and discharge, preparation for the physical exam, collecting and processing specimens, medication administration, and assisting the provider with medical/surgical procedures.

MEDA 1970 - Medical Assisting Clinical Practicum (4 credits)

This course gives the medical assistant student an applied understanding of practice within a medical office. Students complete 180 hours of practicum in a medical office setting and experience the clinical concepts of patient intake and discharge, preparation for the physical exam, collecting and processing specimens, medication administration, and assisting the provider with medical/surgical procedures.

H. Summary of input from and coordination with citizens, business and industry or k-12 education:

Health care employers in the area, including Campbell County Health, private physician offices, and other clinics have requested Gillette College offer a medical assistant program. Currently, the CCH education department is providing OJT for employees hired into like positions. Many who are hired have received no formal training prior to entering a "medical assistant" position in the community. CCH has committed that once a pipeline of Medical Assistant graduates are established they will only seek to hired those with a formal training completion. CCH indicates they currently hire approximately 10-12 new Medical Assistants annually—this does not account for area physician clinics, surgery centers, and other potential employers.

Positive feedback was obtained from the direct supervisors, the health facility education staff, and healthcare providers regarding the proposed program of study.

The current Gillette College Nursing Advisory Board has agreed to provide additional oversight and serve in an advisory capacity for the Medical Assistant Program if approved.

The Medical Assistant certificate program does not directly transfer to another institution. It should be noted although that individual prerequisite/co-requisite courses (Math, Science, English) are transferrable courses and meet many other degree requirements.

The proposed Medical Assistant curriculum was developed with industry partners. Partners expressed a need for the curriculum to include both front office competencies and back office competencies as a part of the curriculum. In addition, they wanted to see evidence the curriculum included substantial practicum experiences. This feedback from area partners was included in the curriculum, specifically the MEDA courses. Students will complete 360 hours of practicum as well.

Campbell County Health owns/operates numerous physician clinics. Supervisors from these areas have agreed to partner with the program to offer clinical experiences for students—both for the front office and the back office practicum courses.

The GC Nursing Advisory Board has agreed to provide advisory oversight for the Medical Assistant Program.

Central Wyoming College Good News Items:

- CWC welcomes Dr. Brad Tyndall as the Interim President of the college. Dr. Tyndall was previously
 the Vice President of Academic Affairs. He has 16 years of experience as a chief academic officer,
 12 years of presidential cabinet experience, 12 years serving on state-wide academic councils and
 seven years of foundation board experience. He was a Fulbright Scholar in Kenya, is proficient in
 multiple languages including French, Arabic and spoken Ethiopian.
- Interdisciplinary Climate change (ICCE) Field Expedition students Lulu Kennedy and Alex Greenwald recently returned from Peru where they conducted glacier and hydrology research in the Peruvian Andes. Kennedy and Greenwald spent the summer working as field and research technicians for CWC instructor Jacki Klancher. The ICCE research project, with partners from the University of Wyoming Center for Environmental Hydrology (WYCEHG) and the American Climber Science Program (ACSP), attracts students from CWC's Archaeology, Environmental Science, Geospatial Information Science and Tech (GIST), and Outdoor Education programs.

Eastern Wyoming College Good News Items:

- The US Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA) has awarded Eastern Wyoming College at \$1.5 million dollar grant to aid in the construction of an Agricultural Technology Education Center (ATEC). ATEC will be a 27,000 sq ft facility, possessing industry leading labs & equipment, and will link Ag education to employment. This facility is also supported by \$3.3 million dollars from a general obligation bond passed by Goshen County voters in November 2014.
- Day ten enrollment at EWC showed a 4.6% increase in headcount and a 5.5% increase in FTE.
- Construction on the Career and Technical Education Center (CTEC) is moving along nicely. The final steel beam will be raised near the end of October or beginning of November. The College will be making the beam available for students, employees and community members to sign before it is placed in the building.

Laramie County Community College Good News Items:

- One of our part-time faculty, Dr. Mary Marion, was invited by Dr. Boyi Dai of the University of
 Wyoming to participate as the lead investigator in a research project titled "Assessing Strength and
 Balance Impairments Following a Major Injury in Collegiate Athletes" and was awarded the grant.
 Dr. Marion and Dr. Dai have been in contact with the athletic programs at UW and at LCCC. They
 are now moving on to the IRB process before seeking athletes to participate in this study.
- We are happy to report that the Class of 2016 has posted a 100% pass rate on the national certification examination in radiography administered by the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT). This exam is required in nearly every state in order to be licensed and work as a radiographer in health care facilities.
- We recently opened our new Flex Tech building, and have begun teaching Diesel Technology, Welding
 and Engineering Technology in the new 46,000 square-foot building. The Flex Tech building was funded
 in part by property owners in Laramie County, with a bond initiative voted for in 2013, and from state
 capital construction funding awarded by the Wyoming Legislature in 2014.

Northern Wyoming Community College District Good News Items:

- The NWCCD Spear-O Mountain Campus hosted researchers and educators from four universities this summer the University of Wyoming, Illinois State University, University of Wisconsin-Lacrosse, and Yale University. The visiting researchers and educators focused on geology and geophysics, ecology, and outdoor learning, with several of the researchers additionally conducting field classes focusing on the unique geology of the Bighorn Mountains, which contain some of the oldest Precambrian granite in the world.
- Both of Gillette College's Cross Country teams are ranked in the top 5 in the United States Track
 and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA)'s NJCAA Division I National Coaches'
 Poll. The Men are ranked 4th, while the women are ranked 5th.
- The Student Veterans of America at Sheridan College will host the fifth annual COMBAT Color Fun Run at Sheridan College on Saturday, Oct. 1st at 1 p.m. All proceeds from the event will go to the National Student Veterans of America and the local chapter.
- The new Whitney Center for the Arts at Sheridan College will host the Colorado Symphony for its opening concert on Oct. 8.

Northwest College Good News Items:

- With a combined 3.575 GPA, the Northwest College Women's Basketball Team's academic performance led all other two-year college programs in the country last year.
- Al and Ann Simpson joined President Stefani Hicswa in speaking at an opening on campus of a
 major multi-cultural art exhibit, "The Bridge," a traveling collection by premier artists from 15
 countries. The exhibit was created by Caravan, an international peacebuilding non-governmental
 organization that focuses on building bridges through the arts between the creeds and cultures of
 the Middle East and West.
- Dr. Lourra Barthuly of Eagle, Colorado, began her new position as NWC's Vice President for Student Services on October 3 following a rigorous national search. Her most recent higher education post was Assistant Vice President of Student Affairs at Colorado Mountain College.
- Northwest College recently launched its newly-redesigned website (www.nwc.edu), the product of months of planning and countless hours of coding and testing.

Western Wyoming Community College Good News Items:

- Four hundred cases of donated water were delivered from Rock Springs to Flint, Mich. Sept. 28 as part of the Water for Flint service-learning project led by WWCC students in Prof. Nish Goicolea's Spanish class. Student Rashel Travis, a Flint native, helped organize the effort.
- ExxonMobil donated \$5,000 to Western's Oil & Gas Production Technology Program Sept. 15, providing funds for student scholarships and learning opportunities. Western enjoys a longstanding partnership with the international oil and gas company and with many other industry partners.
- Western was ranked by BestValueColleges.com as America's best value for online associate degrees among two-year schools.
- Western is transitioning its Emergency Medical Services program from a Workforce Development training cohort to an academic program that allows students to earn a two-year Associate of Applied Science degree in the field. This move lowers the program cost to students. The hybrid class format allows distance students to attend many of the classes remotely via the Internet.



Annual Report for WyomingPBS Fiscal Year 2016

General Manager's Report – Terry Dugas

The past year has been an exciting and challenging time for me and for the WyomingPBS staff. I had to get used to Wyoming, and the staff had to get used to me. So far, I've been able to live up to General Manager Ruby Calvert's advice to me as she was walking out the door, "Don't screw it up."

A good place to start this report is to update my three "first year" goals for WyomingPBS.

1) Increase coverage for the station.

Success in this area has been mixed. We were able to finally get our secondary channel, WyomingPBS Create, carried on Charter Cable. This will become even more important as we incorporate a new "PBSKids" channel into our line-up.

We are also expanding our over the air carriage into Lusk. This project has been delayed as the Engineering staff worked on emergency repairs over the past few months. However, I expect Lusk to be up and running by the end of the Fall.

The biggest failure has been in expanding our coverage on Dish Network. I continue to press for expanded coverage in the Laramie / Cheyenne region, however.

2) Improve the Network's broadcast and on-line capabilities.

Here, too, results have been mixed. We take two steps forward and a lightning strike back.

Due to the declining economy, we withdrew our "microwave migration" budget request. However, we continue to move forward on improving our signal. One of the initial tasks of our new Chief Technology Officer will be to evaluate our entire statewide network and migrate from microwave to IP where possible.

To further encourage on-line viewing, we have been aggressively expanding the number of WyomingPBS productions available for streaming. We continue to put all our new productions online and have also added over a dozen older programs from the series "Wyoming Chronicle" and "Main Street Wyoming."

3) Continue the outstanding tradition of local productions at WyomingPBS.

WyomingPBS producers continue making excellent programs in all our major series. In addition, we continue to work with independent producers to create signature programs like "Blizzard of '49," "Cheney: A Heartbeat Away," and "Over Wyoming."

"Blizzard of '49," "Cheney" and "Live from the Dennison Lodge" will be distributed nationally to PBS stations by NETA, further validating the quality of our programs.

So, where is WyomingPBS going in the future?

My "second year" goals are the same as my first.

1) Increase coverage for the station.

I'll continue to work to make the case for adding WyomingPBS to the Laramie/Cheyenne Dish Network.

However, we will also place an increased focus on promoting the availability of WyomingPBS both over the air and on-line. Through a variety of devices, you can watch WyomingPBS productions and PBS programs "Anytime, Anywhere."

2) Improve the Network's broadcast and on-line capabilities.

The new Chief Technology Officer is making a thorough review of our entire broadcast network. Greater attention to detail in maintenance and repair can make a significant impact on our reliability.

Continuing to move from microwave to Internet Protocol where possible will also increase our reliability.

We are also expanding our network to provide better coverage. We have several locations in the southern part of the state where a daisy chain of transmitters broadcast our over the air signal. Should one transmitter in the chain go off the air, we lose over the air coverage in large portions of the state. Expanding the network to provide redundant service is critical. So if we go off the air in Lander, for example, we still deliver a signal to the rest of Fremont County.

A major challenge for WyomingPBS will be migrating our transmitter and tower from Banner Ridge to Red Grade, outside of Sheridan. The land where the Banner Ridge transmitter sits will be deeded by the state to a private owner. The owner has agreed to give us one year to move. We are investigating sharing a tower site at Red Grade with Wyoming Public Media. This move will provide better over the air service to Sheridan.

We will greatly expand both the quality and quantity of our live on-line streaming. We currently use 1990's technology to stream programs live. This Fall, we will explore moving to state of the art technology. This will allow us to stream all of our WyomingPBS productions at the same time as they are broadcast.

3) Continue the outstanding tradition of local productions at WyomingPBS.

As part of the FY 2017 budget process, I've met with each of the Producers. We have a solid production plan for our series. We will try, when possible, to concentrate our new episodes in July, November, February and May because the audience is measured then by Nielsen.

"Wyoming Chronicle"

We plan to create 21 new "Chronicles" for FY 2017. Eight will air in January and February, covering issues related to the Legislature and State Government. Six will air in April and May. Six will air in October and November. A Christmas themed program will air in December.

"Wyoming Perspectives"

Because we air so few "Perspectives," promoting the series is very difficult. So we will incorporate the 60 minute, live phone in format as a "Wyoming Chronicle Special." We plan for three of these Specials in FY 2017, including the traditional "One on One" with the Governor.

"Main Street, Wyoming"

We will create five new "Main Streets" plus introduce a new format. Three of the programs will be traditional 30 minute single subject documentaries. Two will be a new "magazine format" made up of several five to seven minute "features." These features will also be used as independent shorts on air and will be distributed heavily through social media.

"Farm to Fork"

We will create six new episodes, with three airing in September and October and three airing in May. Clustering the shows will allow us to schedule them at a regular time and promote them as "the Fall (and Spring) season of Farm to Fork."

"Capitol Outlook"

For the upcoming legislative session, "Outlook" will return to 60 minutes. The 30 minute version airing last January, with additional content "on the web" was a valuable experiment. However, feedback from viewers reinforced the problems older audiences have watching programs on-line.

"Our Wyoming"

A major new initiative will be "Our Wyoming." These are a series of short segments, approximately 7:00 in length, highlighting the people, places, and events that make Wyoming unique. As with the short "Main Street, Wyoming" segments, these features will appear on-line and on-air.

Other documentaries in production by WyomingPBS Producers include "Glaciers of the Winds," a study of the receding glaciers in the Wind River range and "Hidden Falls of Yellowstone," a study of the little seen falls in the Bechler region of the park.

We will also continue partnering with the many outstanding independent producers telling the story of the state. In November, we will air an independent production on the sport of "highpointing," visiting the highest points in each state. The program features two high school girls who try to summit Gannett Peak.

In December, former WyomingPBS Producer Geoff O'Gara will tell the story of the "Green River Drift," one of the nation's oldest running cattle drives. Another former WyomingPBS Producer, Tom Manning, is working to tell the story of "The Bozeman Trail."

We will also be hiring a part-time Education coordinator in FY 2017 to revitalize our efforts, focusing on the creation of Learning Objects to use in the classroom.

Funding

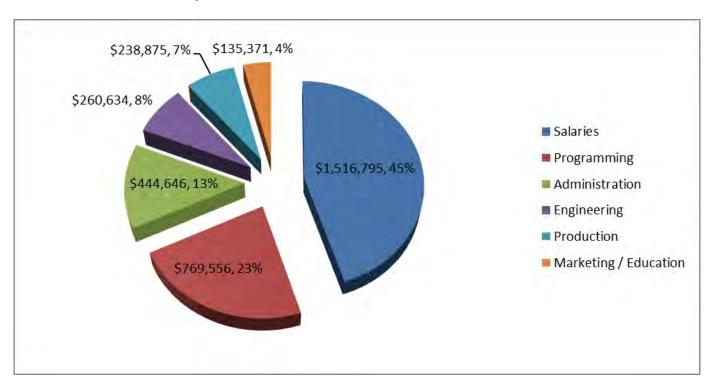
Fiscal Year 2016 Summary

Expenses

WPBS's estimated expenses for FY 2016 were \$3,365,877. Of that, 45% were in salaries and benefits, 23% in Programming, including PBS dues, 13% Administration, 8% Engineering, 7% Production, and 4% Marketing / Outreach / Education.

Salaries for this year were unusually high. Special retirement incentives for both the General Manager and the Assistant General Manager were paid in this Fiscal Year. Production expenses were also high as WyomingPBS produced three major documentaries with outside producers. Engineering was underfunded at 8%. 15% would be more appropriate for a network with our complexity.

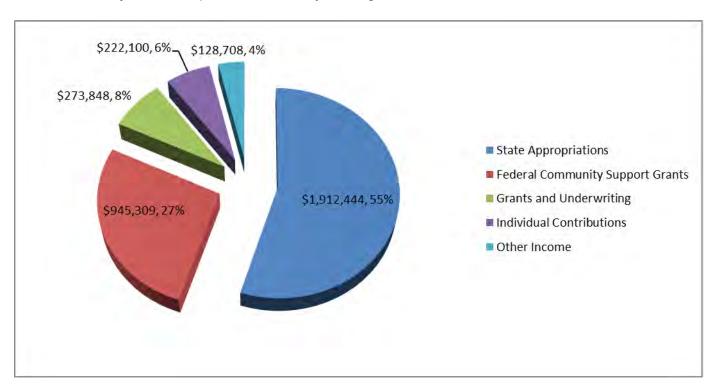
The Education component of WyomingPBS was significantly weakened when the Ready to Learn grant expired in FY 2015. Half of the Education expenditures in FY 2016 were on the Wind River Education Project.



Income

WPBS's estimated income for FY 2016 was \$3,482,409. Of that, 55% came from the State of Wyoming, 27% from Federal Funding, 8% from programming and production related grants and underwriting, 6% from individual Member contributions, and 4% from sources such as contract production and rental from our network of towers.

Grants and Underwriting was above average since special funding was raised to offset the cost of the three major outside productions. Any overage will be carried forward to FY 2017.



Fiscal Year 2017 Summary

The estimated funding from the state is \$1,718,326.50.

We are predicting flat funding from the WyomingPBS Foundation and reduced funding from Grants and Underwriting. However, our funding from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting will increase by approximately \$80,000. As a result, the estimated WyomingPBS budget for FY 2017 will be approximately \$3.2 million, a reduction of \$280,000 from FY 2016. To help meet this shortfall, we will reduce personnel costs by approximately \$200,000.

To reach this target, two positions at WyomingPBS have been eliminated – Network Operations Technician and Promotions Producer. A third position, Assistant General Manager, will not be filled in FY 2017. Existing staff will take on the responsibilities of those positions.

Fortunately, the loss of these positions will not impact our ability to create programs. The production staff is intact, and funding for local programs comes from grants, underwriting, and "Members like you."

However, because we need to increase our Engineering and Education efforts, Fiscal Year 2017 will prove challenging.

<u>Audience</u>

WyomingPBS's audience is measured four times a year by the Nielsen Ratings service, February, May, July, and November. In May of 2010, approximately 31,500 citizens of Wyoming watched WyomingPBS at least once a week. In May of 2016, approximately 32,600 citizens watched at least once a week. Minimum change over six years might be alarming. However, commercial broadcasters in the state lost over 56% of their weekly viewers during this same time. WyomingPBS's ability to hold viewers in the face of cable and online competition comes from the unique programming we offer.

While broadcast viewing has remained stable, online viewing of WyomingPBS content has dramatically increased. During calendar year 2010, WyomingPBS videos were watched online a little over 1,000 times. During calendar year 2015, WyomingPBS videos were watched over 150,000 times online. If current trends continue, WyomingPBS videos will be viewed over 200,000 times online by the end of 2016.

Strategic Plan Update

Because CWC was updating their strategic plan, I delayed the start of updating the WyomingPBS Strategic Plan. However, we need to move forward independent of CWC because of their timeline and changes in senior Administrative positions. I'll start initial work in September, with a concentrated effort to take place in the Spring of 2017.
